Using the 5 key indicators from DfE, we looked at what development needs are a priority for our school and identified current needs and priorities for the future.



Key achievements to date: September 2022 – August 2023

- OPAL continues to be firmly embedded in the school weekly timetable, under the leadership of the HT and OPAL Play team. The team have provided numerous and highly successful open afternoons for parents of the school to see OPAL in action as well as other schools in the City
- Gloucester Schools' Cross Country Championships two pupils selected for the County Squad who attended the The South West Championships
- Gloucester Large Schools' Indoor Sports Hall Athletics Championships Silver medals with a 2nd place Team overall performance
- Heron Girls Football Team reached the Semi-Finals of the Cup
- Heron 1st Football Team GPSFA League Champions
- Heron Large Schools' Swimming Gala team achieved 8 Gold, 5 Silver and 9 Bronze individual medals as Runners-Up
- Heron Rugby Team league champions
- All 60 EYFS, Y1 and Y2 pupils participated in a range of fun physical multi-skills activities as part of the GSSN KS1 Christmas, Easter and Summer Multi-Skills Festivals at Oxstalls University Sports Park.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need: 2023-2024

- To continue the provision of a daily active 15 minutes of physical activity to an Active 30 minutes for all children
- To provide more creative opportunities for all children to participate in physical activity during the whole school timetable
- To facilitate the use of internal and external expertise for staff CPD in response to pupil conference and request for physical activity
- Sports Lead to continue to seek opportunities to participate in a broader range of activities for girls and pupils who have additional needs or who access pupil premium
- To provide a more extensive programme of inter and intra competitive sport for all pupils.
